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CRABOARD WELCOMES

TWO NEW BOARD MEMBERS

The CRABoard welcomed Lewis County Commissioner Lindsey Pollock, DVM, and Thurston County Commissioner Carolina Mejia, to the Board. Both their terms began on January 1, and will expire June 30, 2023 and June 30, 2024, respectively.



Commissioner Pollock is representing medium counties with a population between 30,000 and 150,000. A lifelong resident of Washington state, Commissioner Pollock attended schools in Lewis County before earning a doctorate in Veterinary Medicine with High Honors from Washington State University in 1999. She's been a practicing veterinarian for more than two decades, and she owns and operates a clinic in Winlock. Before becoming a county commissioner in 2021, Dr. Pollock visited all 39 county seats across the state. She's driven on county gravel roads on both sides of the state – and even has a few in her own district! Dr. Pollock and her husband, Scott, a civil engineer, met on the high school rifle team and married in 1996. They make their home on a small farm in Winlock with a dog and a cat.

Commissioner Mejia is representing large counties with a population of over 150,000. Commissioner Mejia was elected to serve as a Commissioner for Thurston County in November of 2020. During her first year in office, she was assigned to serve on several transportation-related committees and boards, and is excited to be appointed to the CRABoard. As an immigrant from Honduras, she immigrated with her family when she was 11 years old and resided in Tennessee until 2013. Mejia holds a B.A. in Business Administration and has focused much of her career in law as a Judicial Assistant for Superior Court.

JANUARY 2022 CRABOARD MEETING UPDATES

CRABoard Staffing Changes

Cameron Cole (GIS Administrator) was promoted to GIS Manager and will continue to oversee the rollout of the GIS-Mo program. Recruitment has begun to backfill his former position. Toni Cox (Transportation Specialist) has transitioned to a newly created role of Administrative Assistant to reflect her growing administrative duties. Congratulations to them both!

CRABoard Actions (January 2022)

The CRABoard approved Resolution 2022-001 Apportion Rural Arterial Trust Account (RATA) funds to regions, which authorized that the accrued amount of \$5,892,469 deposited to the RATA for October, November, and December 2021, be appointed to the regions by the established 2021-2023 biennium percentages after setting aside \$127,052 for administration.

The CRABoard adopted changes to several Washington Administrative Code (WAC) chapters regarding the standards of good practice and the administration of the Rural Arterial Program (RAP) and GIS-Mo system. The chapter changed regarding the standards of good practice was 136-60. The Board adopted the amendment to WAC 136-150-021 to change the due date of the county road levy certification from February 1st to March 1st of every year.

The CRABoard adopted adding Chapter 136-600 (Equipment Rental and Revolving Fund – ER&R), with some minor revisions, but excluding section 136-600-080. CRAB staff will hold a workgroup with the 4 ferry counties to have further discussions on that part for later review and adoption by the Board.

The Board held a public hearing for comments on January 27, 2022, regarding these proposed changes and adoption. Documents have now been filed with the Code Reviser's Office for publication in the Washington State Register.

GIS-MO UPDATES: PHASE-ONE


The GIS-Mo project has been moving closer toward completing its first phase. The first phase of the GIS-Mo project consists of a three-part process. The first part saw the county in the Soft-Launched stage. The Soft-Launched provides county access to Vueworks in GIS-Mo, allowing the individual county to manage their assets inside of GIS-Mo. The second-part of Phase-One is the Full-Launched phase. The Full-Launched phase includes the Soft-Launched feature with the additional function of adding work-orders and reports to the VUEWorks sites, as well as enabling audit trails in GIS-Mo for the individual county. The third and final part is scheduling one-on-one trainings with individual counties in order to handoff of the GIS-Mo application to the county.



Below is the current standing of the first phase of the GIS-Mo project at the end of January 2022. Currently, the first part of the GIS-Mo first phase project has two counties waiting in the queue to be scheduled to complete.





GIS-MO UPDATES: SECOND PHASE

The second phase of the GIS-Mo project will start in February of 2022, with a planning meeting already underway. The second phase of the GIS-Mo project is to tackle the significant updates our application needs. A training plan will identify training materials that need updating, and missing training curriculum necessary for the sustainability of GIS-Mo. One of our important targets to be completed in phase-two is developing the custom report needed by the county. We expect that the second phase of work will grow when all work has been identified to be completed in this phase.



C.A.R.S AND RAP UPDATE



The C.A.R.S (CRAB Annual Reporting System) and RAP (Rural Arterial Program) application update/ upgrade are underway with a stakeholder meeting set for February. The meeting is to narrow down what is needed in the new application for the update/upgrade. We will target the completion of the C.A.R.S and RAP applications by the end of 2022. More to come on this update in the future quarterly report.

SECURITY: LOG4J

The Log4J security vulnerability that affected the IT community worldwide in the last quarter of 2021 was minimal at CRAB. The IT team at CRAB quickly resolved any Log4J issues that were identified. The log4J security issue created zero work-stoppages for CRAB business.

Log4J is a piece of software that logs user activity and app behavior on a computer network. It is an API, or 'application programming interface,' which fetches and carries data across the network. By exploiting the flaw, dubbed Log4Shell, hackers can take control of servers which run in the internal network of the business and repurpose them for their own needs for performing numerous malicious activities such as stealing data, downloading ransomware, account take over, using the account to traverse an organization's network, and potentially bringing down the entire network. This flaw is very easy to exploit, enticing many bad actors.

When the vulnerability was made public, it was described as a zero-day (or 0day), which means it was being targeted and potentially acted upon before the software developers knew it existed. In other words, the developers had zero days to implement a fix for the vulnerability before it may have been used in an attack.


Software Support

 Design Systems provided minimal assistance to county design staff through CRAB-NET support ticketing during the quarter.



Pinnacle Series LMS

- CRAB continues to add help documents and videos in support of VUEWorks and Road and Highways.
- 2021 4TH quarter performance
 - The platform has 801 registered users and has had 106 unique active logins during the period.
 - Users have accessed 543 individual assets and 280 learning path courses.
 - Of the assets accessed, 231 were CRAB's custom content in support of GIS-Mo, RAP Online,
 CARS and Sincpac. This is a 45% increase over the previous quarter.
- Using imputed averages for assets and courses, CRAB provided approximately 178 personhours of training.



This is the first quarter that the LMS has seen a substantial decrease in unique user logins but has maintained a strong total content consumed and average users per day.


UAS Program

- The program manager worked with Spokane County in November to collect data over five bridges
 with the FLIR infrared camera. Several data sets processed without errors and showed promise in
 the identification of defects in the bridge deck. As with any new process, we are still refining the
 standard operating procedures to collect the most clean, accurate data possible. Poor weather
 precluded any further flights for the remainder of 2021.
- In December, the program manager met with WSDOT to discuss how we can participate in their
 initiative for the use of drones in bridge inspection. WSDOT has been working with Skydio, a drone
 manufacturer, to test the feasibility of using their drones to inspect bridge decks, superstructure
 and substructure. This study is very similar in scope to what CRAB had begun to study in October
 of 2021. Since both agencies are working toward a similar goal, we feel it is in our best interest to
 work together to advance this initiative. This was an introductory meeting and further plans to
 participate will be discussed in 2022.
